

research

"By adding research ... we are pushing the pendulum closer to the middle [between *public writing* and *private writing*] in order to reach more readers and make our own personal story more encompassing.... Combining research and story creates connective tissue and forges [a] universal chord" (Gutkind 68).

immersion

"Using the technique of immersion, writers can tailor a public story ... in a way that allows them to own it to make it their story. A faithful immersion will ultimately yield intimacy, and the deeper writers immerse themselves, the more ... intimate the immersion will become" (Gutkind 71)

GSAN Some Ways to Integrate Research



- Make historical connections: link your experiences to the larger sweep of history
- Provide ancillary information: make supplemental data more texturized and evocative
- Use local colour: ground the work in a specific time and place
- Integrate other viewpoints: broaden the topic and enhance your credibility
- Quote an expert: connect your private ideas to the larger sphere of public ideas (65-68)

Ger Some Methods of Immersion

Interviewing	Parachuting	Embedding
Asking your subject a series of specific questions tailored to the subject matter, either in person, or via telephone, e-mail, Zoom, etc.	Visiting a specific location, person, event, etc. for a limited length of time to derive general ideas about the subject matter and related issues	Making a specific location, person, event, etc. a part of your life for an extended period of time to develop intimate knowledge in granular detail



Ger Some Interview Strategies



- Be focused: Have a clear reason to conduct the interview
- Follow up: Ask for more information if you need it
- Be in person: You can only learn some things by being there
- · Select an interesting subject: You want broad audience appeal
- · Be realistic: Remain aware of your resources and limitations
- Remember it's about people: You're interviewing a human, not just a subject (Gutkind 78-82)
