

There are a number of campus libraries. The following are most relevant to MIR/PMIR students:


- Stauffer Library: Business, Humanities and Social Sciences, Art, Music

# Research Tools: (1) Omni

Omni will identify resources in a variety of formats including books (print and electronic), articles, videos, maps, government documents, music, data sets, open access materials, and more. You can discover materials that are not available at Queen's but that you can freely request either within Omni or through interlibrary loan.

Use Omni when you want to find:

- Background information
- Articles to get you started
- An exact book or article title
- Various formats (e.g. books, newspapers or streaming videos)
- Sources on an interdisciplinary topic
- Local and/or unique resources



To narrow your Omni results, take advantage of *Filters*. Limit results by resource type, language, publication date, subject, and more.

#### **Research Tools: (2) Subject-Specific Databases**

You will be required to search databases to find journal articles, newspaper articles, citations to book chapters, and more. The library subscribes to over 650 article indexes and databases and over 80,000 electronic journals and newspapers.

Library subject guides identify core and related recommended databases for each discipline. (See <u>http://guides.library.gueensu.ca/industrial-relations/articles</u> for a complete list.)

Most frequently used databases for MIR studies:

- <u>ABI / INFORM Global:</u> international business and management academic journals and industry publications. Includes human resources, compensation and benefits, labor relations, management theory, economics, organizational behaviour, conflict resolution, negotiation and more. Includes full-text of the *Wall Street Journal*.
- <u>Business Source Premier</u>: international business and management academic journals and industry publications. Includes human resources, compensation and benefits, labor relations, management theory, economics, organizational behaviour, conflict resolution, negotiation and more. Includes full-text of the *Harvard Business Review*.
- <u>Canadian Human Rights Reporter</u>: Includes the full text of decisions with headnote, summary, keywords and cases, legislation and authorities cited for reported decisions.
- <u>CanLII Canadian Legal Information Institute</u>: Freely available legislative and judicial texts, as well as legal commentaries, from federal and all provincial and territorial jurisdictions. Includes labour boards, tribunals and texts of decisions from bodies including the Public Service Labour Relations Board and Ontario Labour Relations Board.
- <u>Canadian Newsstream</u>: Full text articles from major Canadian newspapers. Content updated daily. Globe & Mail and Toronto Star coverage includes today's paper; 2-day embargo period for most other papers. Useful for national and provincial economic and policy coverage and companies, industries and workplaces.
- <u>LabourSource</u>: (Westlaw) Contains an extensive collection of court, arbitration and labour board decisions, legislation and commentaries including online versions of: Canadian Labour Arbitration Summaries (C.L.A.S.), Labour Arbitration Cases (L.A.C), Brown & Beatty, Canadian Labour Arbitration, and more.
- PressReader: Provides access to today's newspapers from around the world in over 55 languages.
- **PsycINFO**: The definitive resource in psychology, PsycINFO indexes journal articles, reports, book chapters and other scholarly material. For students of Industrial Relations, the resource indexes material on the subject of organizational behaviour.
