### **Course Description**

This course examines comparative studies in Gender-Based Violence (GBV) within matrilineal and patrilineal cultures across West Africa. Students will gain foundational knowledge in African feminist and womanist epistemologies and acquire insights into the unique forms of power that pre-colonial West African women exercised to empower themselves and their communities while working to prevent the occurrence of domestic violence within their societies.
