To date, the Faculty of Law and the School of Graduate Studies have been scheduled to attend Council's January meeting and the Smith School of Business representative will attend Council's May meeting. 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	Marlene Brant-Castellano informed Council that this would be her last year serving on Council.
	The nominating committee recommends that both co-chair positions operate as follows: Incoming Co-Chair (1 year), Co-chair (2 years), and Past Co-Chair (1 year), to support continuity and provide guidance.
	Once all member acceptances are finalized, the Caucus will be engaged to select the incoming co-chair; the university senior administration will do the same for the university position. The goal is to have these positions in place for the January meeting.
Adoption of the Agenda	The agenda was adopted as circulated.
Report from Provost Benoit-Antoine Bacon	 The agentia was adopted as circulated. The Provost welcomed new and returning members of Council. He reported that Queen's is on track to meet its November 1 enrolment target of 4,517 first-year undergraduate students. Indigenous applications and offers have continued to rise. First-year self-identified Indigenous enrolment has remained relatively stable at 69 for 2017-18. Queen's is hiring more faculty members – 200 over five years; we have already welcomed 36 this year, two of whom are Queen's National Scholars, who will contribute significantly to strengthening Queen's scholarship in Indigenous studies. Another Queen's National Scholar, Dr. Norman Vorano, has received a Pierre Elliot Trudeau Foundation Fellowship – one of the most prestigious and competitive awards in Canada. Dr. Vorano, assistant professor in Art History and Art Conservation, and curator of Indigenous art at the Agnes Etherington Art Centre, was recognized for his work with Indigenous communities in the Canadian Arctic to record, understand, and share Inuit art history. Provost Bacon said he is pleased to see that, more and more, conversations about Indigenous histories and experiences are taking place on campus, for example, through the new Intercultural awareness certificate, the Queen's Reads program, academic programming such as the undergraduate course in Canadian Aboriginal Law, and through student transition and support programming. As noted in the TRC implementation progress update, there are also physical changes happening on campus, including the expansion of the

	 plinth, which will detail the history of the territory upon which Queen's sits. The Provost said the plinth is a relatively small but, very meaningful initiative to recognize the original inhabitants of this land. He thanked the members of the Cultural Awareness and Programming Working Group of ACQU for their assistance with this important project. He also noted that one of the most important changes since the release of
	the TRC report is the establishment of the Director of Indigenous Initiatives position, and the appointment of Kanonhsyonne/Jan Hill, in this new role. Provost Bacon extended his congratulations to Jan and said he and Deputy Provost (Academic Operations and Inclusion) Teri Shearer are looking forward to working with her, and learning from her, in the years ahead.
TRC Task Force Implementation Committee Update Teri Shearer	 Deputy Provost Shearer acknowledged the many people doing great work across the institution. She said her report is a small subset of initiatives taking place across the institution. She offered her congratulations to Jan in her new role and noted a few initiatives she is working on, including leading Queen's participation in the provincially-funded <i>Pathways for Indigenous Learners: Collaborating across Aboriginal Institutes, Colleges, and Universities</i> to develop bridging and pathways programming and wraparound support services to facilitate transition to university studies and ensure Indigenous students' success. Articulation agreements between universities, colleges, and Aboriginal Institutes developed within this project will allow for the seamless transition of Indigenous learners across the sector. The Deputy Provost also noted that the Four Directions Aboriginal Student Centre and the Queen's University International Centre have jointly developed an Intercultural Awareness Certificate Program, which is already highly enrolled, and responds to a TRC Task Force Report recommendation. The Faculties and Schools will be submitting their five-year TRC implementation plans by end of December. Ms. Shearer invited Council to the unveiling of the Indigenous plinth on October 16 at 2pm on a well-travelled path across University Avenue from Richardson Hall.
	Co-Chair Brant Castellano thanked Deputy Provost Shearer for her report and noted that all of the reports received by Council reflect a new phase of activity and commitment across the University, supporting the broad-based public education necessary to sustain momentum toward reconciliation. She said that she is proud to be part of what is happening at Queen's.
Matariki Student Mobility Program Presentation Lindsay Morcom	Dr. Morcom and three students travelled to the University of Western Australia in Perth on Nyungar Territory this summer. She took Council, day by day, through the week-long trip and provided recommendations for future events, suggesting that Queen's and the local community would have much to offer visitors and network members from around the world.
