


Student Group Responsible for Hazing






This reflects a high number of UDSI tickets issued at Homecoming, and is consistent with 2021-2022.




Misconduct Involving Property




Most Assigned Outcomes by Category

### **Respondent Demographics:**

52% Students responsible for Code violations who were in their first year at Queen's.

Many incidents occurred in Residence,

Male students responsible for Code violations, despite representing only 39% of the Queen's student population.

### Harassment and Discrimination:

- 4 Student cases were referred to Early Resolution under the Harassment and Discrimination Prevention and Response Policy.
- 14 Student cases referred under the Policy went through a formal process.
  - As awareness of the Policy increases, more students are reporting experiences of harassment and discrimination. Resources and information are available in the Policy.

### **Appeals:**

Appeals were heard by the NAM Appeal Panel, increasing by 125% over 2021-2022.
