1. Why did you select Queen's University?

One of my best friends went to Queen's the year before me and when he came back to Montreal at Thanksgiving, he said I had to go to Queen's – it would be perfect for me. My decision to go to Queen's was one of the first decisions I remember making based on intuition – and it continues to be one of the best decisions I ever made.

I have now completed three terms as a Councillor and currently ex-officio on Council by virtue of my position as Council Trustee. 10. Do you have any words of wisdom for incoming Councillors?
