
October 15-18 -Fall Reading Week - Classes suspended

This month in Queen's History:



Do you recognize the 1996 AMS President with Principal Bill Leggett unveiling the Sutherland plaque?

(University Councillor) <u>Greg Frankson</u> was elected President of the AMS, the first black student to occupy the role. Mr. Frankson was determined to resurrect the memory of Queen's first black graduate, Jamaica-born Robert Sutherland, an Arts graduate of 1854.

Robert Sutherland (c1830-1878) was the first student and graduate of colour at Queen's and one of the university's most important early benefactors. When he died in 1878 of

pneumonia, he left his sizable estate of \$12,700 entirely to Queen's. He had drawn up his will just three weeks before his death. It is unclear why he did so, but friends recalled that he often said Queen's was one place where "he had always been treated as a gentleman." Sutherland's gift was used to launch a fundraising campaign that helped stop Queen's from being annexed by the University of Toronto. In appreciation, **Principal George Monro Grant** ordered that a large granite tombstone be placed on his grave in Toronto's Mt Pleasant Cemetery - where it still stands - to mark his connection with Queen's.

For more than a century, Mr. Sutherland's legacy was not broadly recognized. In 1975, the City of Kingston, prompted into action by the Jamaican-Canadian community, erected a plaque to Mr. Sutherland's memory at Queen's and the Jamaican High Commissioner attended the unveiling. In February 2009, Queen's Board of Trustees unanimously approved a student-initiated motion to name the Policy Studies Building at 138 University Avenue after alumnus Robert Sutherland. An unveiling ceremony was held on **October 3, 2009**.

Councillor John Armitage



It was a very special day on September 14, 2024 for the Armitage family and for Queen's Rowing to christen the newest boat in the boathouse, "The John Armitage". Councillor John Armitage is one of the founders of the Kingston Rowing Club in 1977. With over 40 years as the Queen's Rowing coach (a 3-time OUA Coach of the Year), and coaching on the national and international level, he is a legend to the sport of rowing in Kingston and at Queen's! Hate Has No Home Here Poster Campaign



Hill Werth, Ed'24 is providing Queen's and Kingston businesses with a way to stand strong together against hate faced by marginalized communities. A 2024 recipient of <u>Kingston 40 under 40 Award</u>, Hill's impactful poster *Hate Has No Home Here*, has even caught the <u>attention of the House of Commons</u>.

Many local businesses and schools have jumped in as proud supporters for this marker of safe spaces, including the <u>Office of the Rector</u>. Niki Boytchuk-Hale has partnered with Hill as a diplomat of the campaign. This fall, 225 posters will be posted around student government officer, the Division of Student Affairs, and all residence buildings.

Queen's Bands - spirit and tradition since 1905!



Queen's Bands are called "bands," plural, because there are actually six of them:

- pipe band
- brass band
- cheerleaders
- highland dancers
- drum corps
- colour guard

The Bands got their start in 1905 when a few first-year students decided to form a marching brass band "to help things along at football games." Over time, the Bands established themselves as the university's most recognized ambassadors. After Gaels' victories, the band led impromptu snake dances down Princess Street, and they marched in Grey Cup, Santa Claus, Cotton Bowl and Macy's Thanksgiving parades across the continent. Queen's mascot, <u>Boo Hoo the bear</u>, cheers our Gaels on to victory with Queen's Bands. While nowadays there's a student inside the Boo Hoo costume, in the 1920s and for decades later, Queen's had a live bear. The original Boo Hoo was a real bear cub purchased by students in 1922.
